Albany Beaten In Overtime Thriller

Even the build-up could not com pare to the 45 minutes of tense ramatic basketball displayed at Albany's University Gym last night. The two top ranked Division III teams in the state, number one squared off in a battle for eastern supremacy. At the final buzzer, Potsdam remained on top, but just barely, edging the Danes 70-68 in

Potsdam, the third ranked Division III team in the nation, improv ed their unblemished record to 11-0, Albany's home court had on them. In gaining their first-ever victory in University Gym, the Bears also broke the Danes 19 game home winning streak, handed Albany their first SUNYAC loss of the season, and dropped the Danes record to

'We were fortunate to win,' said Potsdam coach Jerry Welsh. "We were also fortunate to only be three points down at the half because Albany completely outplayed us. Albany's got a great team and a great coach, and it's tought to beat them anywhere - on heir court or ours. It was an impor-

Rob Clune's two free throws with 1:17 remaining in regulation gave the Danes a 66-64 lead, but Scott Franko's short jumper just 12 seconds later brought Potsdam even. Albany held for the last shot, seconds left was short, and bounced


Potsdam's Derrick Rowland fouled Dane center Kelvin Jones with four minutes left in the overtime period, and Jones connected on two pressure-packed free throws to give Albany a 68-66 lead. Rowland's one handed dunk tied the score at 68-68, and the Danes took control with 3:30 remaining.

structed his squad to stall for the last shot, but after running all but 13 seconds off the clock, Dane forward Pete Stanish drove to the basket, was fouled, and stepped to the foul line. 

TAP Proposes Stricter Guidelines

Minimum GPA's and Credits Proposed

In an attempt to avoid misuse of Tuition Assistance Program (TAP) funds, the State Department of Education is proposing stricter guidelines for governing awards.

According to present rules, TAP is awarded to "full-time students in good academic standing." The fulltime student must complete (pass or fail) at least three credits his first semester, six credits the second semester and a minimum of twelve credits for each semester following.

Credit minimum requirements will be tighented, according to Assistant Commissioner of Higher Education, Don Nolan. "What we're trying to avoid is having beginning of the semester, making hem eligible for TAP, then dropping down to six or nine credits dur ing the semester and still receiving a 'ull TAP award." said Nolan.

He said, however, each school would establish a review committee hat would excuse students from dropping below the credit minimum for extenuating circumstances such

as a death in the family or illness. even more personel due to state The committee would have the authority to waive a penalty in the TAP award.

The "good academic standing" clause is presently defined by the student's particular institution.



Ex-Beatle Remains Jailed

TOKYO (AP) Members of the rock band Wings left Japan for the United States Sunday night, leaving behind their leader, ex-Beatle Paul McCartney, 37, to spend his fifth night in jail on suspicion of narcotics violations, according to a police spokesman. A group of youthful fans, mean-while, planned a protest rally at Tokyo's Martial Arts Hall on Monday to demand McCartney's release. "Paul com-mitted a crime, but it is unbearable for us, his fans, to see his image being spoiled," said Hideko Kobayashi, leader of the rally. An official of the Tokyo Metropolitan Police Department, who asked not to be identified, said the band's main entourage of about 40 persons had left Japan.

Technology Kept From Soviets

WASHINGTON (AP) The Carter administration today revoked the licenses for the export of spare computer parts for a controversial Soviet truck plant. The action was the latest in a series of steps taken by administration officials to try to penalize the Soviet Union for its military intervention in Afghanistan. The revocation of the export licenses will block the shipment of high-technology goods intended for a truck factory begun in the early 1970's with the U.S. help on the Kama River in the Ural Mountains of northeastern Russia. "Trucks produced at the Kama River plant have been used in Afghanistan in support of the Soviet military invasion," Commerce Secretary Philip M. Klutznick said in a statement. "Under this circumstance and after consulta-tion with the secretaries of Defense and State and other departments, I have decided to revoke the outstanding licenses for spare parts for the Kama River computer imediately," Klutznick added. Robert Amdur, spokesman for the Commerce Department's international trade division, said figures were not immediately available on the number of licenses or the value of goods involved.

Hopeful For Hostages?

(AP) U.N. Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim says he hopes a plan devised during his visit to Iran will lead to the release of the American hostages in Tehran. But the Iranian militants holding the Americans captive still insist the deposed shah must be returned before the hostages are freed. "We have worked out a mechanism... and I hope mechanism will make it possible to satisfy the government of Iran and lead to release of the hostages," Waldheim told reporters Sunday in New Delhi, India. The U.N. chief would give no details of his plan. But after his visit to Tehran, Iranian officials said he proposed setting up a nission to investigate the Iranian revolutionary regime's charges against the deposed shah. At the time, Foreign Minister Sadegh Ghotbzadeh welcomed the proposal. But he said the commission's findings would not be binding on Iran, and the hostages would not be released un-til the shah was returned. Ghotbzadeh repeated this stand Saturday, telling a French interviewer that the return of the shah, now living in Panama, was the only way out of the "It's easy," he said. "They give us the shah. We give them the hostages.'

Arab Leaders Rush To Meet

(AP) In closed-door meetings and hurried jet flights, Arab envoys were engaged in intensive diplomatic activity in the Middle East today that informed sources in Beirut said was aimed at forging a common front on the issue of the Soviet military intervention in Afghanistan. Afghanistan's seven rebellious Moslem factions, meanwhile, were reported try-

ing to unite for a "holy war" against the Soviet occupation army. The Mideastern Arab states and other nations of the Islamic conference are scheduled to meet in Islamabad, Pakistan, next Saturday to discuss the situation in Afghanistan, where Soviet and Afghan government forces are trying to put down a rebellion by fundamentalist Moslem tribesmen. Several Islamic states, including Saudi Arabia, have already announced they will be boycotting the summer Olympics in Moscow in protest. U.S. ambassadors delivered personal messages from President carter to the leaders of Bahrain, Oman and Sudan today dealing with the Afghan crisis, according to official reports from those governments. The contents of the messages were not reveal-

Tito Improving From Surgery

(AP) President Josip Broz Tito spem a quiet night and was in good condition today following the lite-saving amputa-tion of his left leg, his doctors reported. Yugoslavia's 87-year-old leader was operated on Sunday for the second time in eight days to prevent fatal gangrene poisoning due to blockage of the arteries of the leg. "The general condi-tion of President Tito is good," his doctors said in a medical bulletin issued today. They said his pulse, blood pressure and temperature were within normal limits. Belgrade remained calm despite speculation all week that the Russians might try to coerce Yugoslavia back into the Kremlin's orbit if Tito, the pioneer of the independent communism, died. Anti-aircraft guns were set up Belgrade and Zagreb airports, but this appeared to be part of a nationwide, low-priority "vigilance" program ordered after the Soviet intervention in Afghanistan. In Bonn, the West German newspaper reports that the Soviets were reinforcing their troops in Central Europe because of Tito's

Moslem Groups May Merge

(AP) Afghanistan's seven rebellious Moslem factions are reported trying to unite for a holy war against the Soviet ocpation army. Radio Tehran reported that an official of the Afghan Islamic Organization in the Iranian capital told it discussions were underway among the rebel groups to torm a single guerilla front. "The Afghan revolutionaries" duty is to expel the Soviet forces from Afghanistan through jihad holy war, not through negotiations," the official reportedly said. The Moslem rebels in Afghanistan are divided along tribal lines. They have been fighting their own separate wars since the first communist coup in April 1978 and were reported to control half the country or more. But the necessity for unification and coordination became apparent last month when the Soviet Union sent as many as 100,000 troops into Afghanistan.

Fresh Soviet Forces in Afghan

(AP) The Soviet Union has mounted a transcontinental airlift to pour fresh Soviet combat forces into Afghanistan, replacing local troops who are deserting their government's cause "like so many disappearing soda bubbles," diplomatic sources in Pakistan said Monday. U.S. in telligence sources in Washington estimated that Soviet dead, wounded, captured and missing in the war against anti-communist rebels might now total 2,000. Foreign jour nalists reported from the Afghan capital of Kabul that Moscow has also sent in thousands of Soviet administrators to take firm control of the government, whose communist bureaucracy was hard hit by two years of bloody in fighting. The new Afghan interior minister, meanwhile, said former President Hafizullah Amin was overthrown in A coup last Dec. 27 because he had been plotting with Moslem fanatics and the CIA to end Marxist rule in Afghanistan. The minister, Sayed Golabzoi, speaking at a news conference, claimed Amin had planned his power play for Dec. 29, AP correspondent Marcus Eliason reported from Kabul. The new regime has claimed repeatedly that Amin was a CIA agent. The Soviet troops who began arriv ing in Kabul in massive numbers Dec. 25 helped topple Amin two days later and replaced him with Babrak Karmal Both men were Marxists, but Karmal was regarded as friendlier to Moscow. Only one year ago, I was a common student attending Albany State University, I did ordinary things like study, eat campus food, then study some more. I was happy; I went out on weekends and even occasionally had a date. More specifically, there are other factors which are especially corvenient to the visiting American. Among these factors is that almost everyone in Copenhagen speaks English. This affords easy communication perience on both parts. Also Copenhagen is centrally located in Western Europe and conveniently facilitates travel to the rest of

Surviving the Life

"... And you run and you run to catch up with the sun but it's sinking, and racing around to run up behind you again. The sun is the same in the relative way, but you're older, and shorter of breath, and one day closer to death . . ."

Man did not invent time, he just gauged it. He stumbled onto such concepts as change, past and memory, hence, the inability to control time was realized. So each of us has now got seventy years to do it in, whatever "it" is, whatever seventy years really are. Individual perceptions of those variables are not as important as the universal constant of a moving clock, aging us, making events become history, taking our lives. We can never control the passage of time, but we certainly have rule


