It has been customary that in the presence of visitors, we try to display our best manners so as to mike the best possible impression. Odly enough, this
exiom holds true after school hours and especially at athletic contests, and undoubyedly if this rule is not immediately heodad, more drastic measures will be taken to keep order.

The Student Council has been asked to take cherge of this situintion, but we sincerely believe that action could be delayed until after the next game if cissurance could be given that there would be no such demonstrction.
