AMERICAN COUNCIL OF LEARNED SOCIETIES HONORS FIVE UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY FACULTY

Five members of The University at Albany faculty have received honors recently in the form of fellowships and grants-in-aid from the American Council of Learned Societies. Recipients are Robert Howell, assistant professor of philosophy; William Reedy, associate professor of history; Roger Herzel, assistant professor of theater; John Monfasani, assistant professor of history; and John Overbeck, associate professor of classics.

The American Council of Learned Societies, with offices in New York, is a private, non-profit federation of 42 national scholarly associations devoted to the advancement of humanistic studies in all fields of learning.

Dr. Howell and Dr. Reedy are among 97 recipients of fellowships for periods of six months to a year, made possible by grants from the Carnegie Corporation of New York, the Ford Foundation, and the National Endowment for the Humanities. Dr. Howell's project for which the fellowship has been awarded is "Kant's Transcendental Deduction of the Categories," while Dr. Reedy will study "Select Medieval Basset Charters."

Dr. Herzel and Dr. Monfasani have received fellowships in a new program for post-doctoral research in the humanities, restricted to recent recipients of the Ph.D. degree and funded by the Ford Foundation. Thirty-two recipients were chosen from nearly 400

The 130-year old Milne School is accepting a few new students in grades 11 and 12, however, with a number of 11th graders being able to complete their required schooling in one year. According to Milne Principal Thomas Boehm, the Milne faculty is "one of the most experienced in the state. Eight of the full-time faculty members have taught an average of 20 years and four possess doctorates. All have been teacher educators."

Milne provides learning experiences in all major required and elective subject areas, as well as a wide range of interscholastic and intramural activities. Parents and students are actively involved in planning curricular and co-curricular events.

"The relatively low student-faculty ratio should provide opportunities for maximum student-faculty interaction," Dr. Boehm asserts.

Milne was founded in 1845 as The Experimental School and has continued under various names as a laboratory school in conjunction with what is now The University at Albany. Dr. Boehm notes that Milne "has maintained a reputation for providing an exemplary learning environment for high school students and teachers-in-training."

JAZZ WORKSHOP HIGHLIGHTS SUMMER PROGRAMS IN MUSIC AND OPERA AT

ALBANY

A six-week jazz workshop, with noted area musician Nick Brignola, will highlight The University at Albany's 1976 summer programs in music and opera, offered in collaboration with the Lake George Opera Festival and the Saratoga Performing Arts Center.

The jazz workshop, which carries three credits, is scheduled June 28-Aug. 6 and will include the application of American jazz to actual performance. Techniques of ensemble playing, styles, improvisation, and teaching will be explored and visiting artists will participate. Mr. Brignola also will lead another, concurrent, six-week session, which/trace jazz from its origin to its current expression.

Also scheduled for the June 28-Aug. 6 period are three-credit courses on the fundamentals of writing and performing music, with Laurence Farrell, and on masterpieces of music, with Karl Peterson. Mr. Farrell and Mr. Peterson both are members of the Music Department faculty at the university.

Two three-week courses are scheduled, each worth three credits and scheduled June 28-July 16: music and science: an interactive study, with Burt Levy, and electronic music, with Joel Chadabe, both of the Music Department.

A 1-2 credit piano worskhop is slated June 9-18 (two weeks) and will be conducted by university pianists Findlay Cockrell and Paula Ennis.

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MUSIC AND OPERA PROGRAMS

A special program in opera will be held June 28-Aug. 6 in the Lake George Opera Theatre in Glens Falls, concurrently with the Lake George Opera Festival. The six-week, three-credit practicum for the professional opera stage will include intensive training in stage techniques for the singing actor, coaching, and analysis of roles and diction. The comprehensive training will culminate in performances at Glens Falls and the university's Performing Arts Center. In addition, a limited number of qualified students will be considered for professional participation in the Lake George Opera Company.

Faculty for the opera workshop are Thomas Lloyd, director of the workshop; Marshall Williamson, music director and repertory coach; and Dorothy Danner, dance instructor. Seminars in acting, stage direction, makeup, costume, and other related areas will be offered by staff members of the Lake George Opera Company.

CASDA SCHEDULES THREE CONFERENCES AT UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY

Capital Area School Development Association (CASDA), The University at Albany, will sponsor three conferences this summer. The Albany Area Educational Secretaries Conference will be held June 28; the 26th annual Custodial Conference is scheduled June 29-30; and the seventh annual School Business Management Summer Workshop is set for July 11-14. All three will take place on the Albany campus.

Reservations for the secretaries' conference, which is cosponsored by the Albany Area Educational Secretaries Association, must be received by CASDA by June 21. The cost is \$5 per person for CASDA schools and \$7 per person for non-CASDA schools. The keynote speaker will be Sandra Culp, Bicentennial associate and editor, who will discuss "The Role of Women at the Time of the American Revolution."

Four workshops will follow, featuring Martha Brown, Albany County Extension Service, "Consumerism: Change for Your Dollar"; Mary Ann Ellsworth, marketing representative for International Business Machines (IBM), "Work Processing Using Latest IBM Equipment"; David Silver, director, Municipal Division, New York State Department of Audit and Control, "The Audit and the Secretary"; and Rita Bogdan, Albany Business College, "Upgrading Basic Skills."

In the afternoon, Esther Schneider and Beverly Pasley, Capital Area Community Health Plan, will examine pre-paid health care. Then, William O'Neill, New York State School Boards Association, and Bernard Ryan, Civil Service Employees Association, will present two

views of the proposed changes in the retirement systems for public employees.

June 21 also is the deadline for reservations for the custodial conference, which will include exhibits of supplies and materials, general sessions, workshops, and problem clinics. Reservation fees, not including luncheons (\$3 each day) are \$10 for each of the first two registrants for a CASDA school district and \$5 for each additional registrant; \$15 per person for persons from non-CASDA districts.

Al Danzig, former deputy director, New York State Bureau of Motor Vehicles and presently a public relations consultant, will be the keynote speaker the first day of the conference. NOTED PSYCHOANALYST ON UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY CRIMINAL JUSTICE STAFF

FOR FALL SESSION

Fritz Redl, noted psychoanalyst, has been appointed visiting professor in The University at Albany's School of Criminal Justice for the fall 1976 session. Dr. Redl served as Visiting Robert A. Pinkerton Professor at the school during the 1975-76 academic year. He formerly served as Distinguished Professor of Behavioral Sciences at Wayne State University.

Dr. Redl's professional activities and memberships include The Governor's Commission on Youth and Delinquency, State of Maryland; Advisory Committee, State of Michigan, Department of Mental Health, Lansing, Michigan; Committee on Youth Services, U.S. Children's Bureau, Washington, D.C.; Society for Correctional Psychologists; and the American Orthopsychiatric Association.

His teaching experience began in the Vienna Public Schools and includes the University of Chicago. He founded Pioneer House which was the world's most famous residential treatment center for delinquent youths. The two books describing the Pioneer House program, "Children Who Hate" and "Controls from Within" are widely recognized as classics. Dr. Redl also has been a psychoanalyst in private practice.

Some 500 tax practitioners are expected to attend a one-day seminar on annual return/report of employee benefit plan at The University at Albany on Wednesday, June 23. The seminar is sponsored jointly by the Albany District Office of the United States Internal Revenue Service, the U.S. Department of Labor, and the university. Co-sponsors are the New York State Bar Association, the New York State Society of Certified Public Accountants, the Empire State Association of Public Accountants, the New York State Association.

Reno Knouse, professor of business education at the university and coordinator of the seminar, said that the seminar is designed to give insight on how to prepare annual reports of employee pension plans (Form 5500 Series) for submission to the Internal Revenue Service and the Department of Labor. IRS and DOL speakers will cover Forms 5500, 5500-C, 5500-K, and supporting schedules in detail. In addition, a portion of the program will deal with defects noted in plan submissions intended to comply with the Employee Retirement Income Security Act, an explanation of the special Reliance Procedures, and a discussion of procedures to be followed relative to Pattern Plan submissions. Materials will be supplied, and a question-and-answer period will follow the presentations.

The seminar will begin at 8:30 a.m. with coffee and doughnuts. The program will start at 9:00 in Lecture Center 18, and conclude at 4 p.m. Participating will be Stanley Goldstein, chief, Employee

UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY FACULTY AUTHOR SEVERAL BOOKS

Several books written by members of The University at Albany faculty have been published in recent months.

"The Horrors of the Half-Known Life: Male Attitudes Toward Women and Sexuality in Nineteenth-Century America" (Harper & Row) by Graham Barker-Benfield, assistant professor, American Studies Program, was selected for the Book-of-the-Month Club for April. The book examines 19th Century attitudes of sexual repression of females in America, how those attitudes have been politically institutionalized, and how they have become medically and psychologically reinforced. The author traces the social-psychological causes of the attitudes to their political-economic course in American laissez-faire democracy.

James Tedeschi, psychology, is a co-author of "Social Inter-dependence, Interaction and Influence Psychology" (John Wiley & Sons, Inc.). In the work, written with Sven Lindskold, he shows that contemporary social psychology can be integrated through the use of social influence theory.

The book is described as presenting an integrated approach to social psychology that focuses on the definition and examination of social influence. In their cumulative organization of material, the authors explore numerous middle-range theories, emphasizing experimental perspective.

FACULTY AUTHOR SEVERAL BOOKS

James McClellan, foundations of education, is the author of "Philosophy of Education" (Prentice-Hall, Inc.). The book treats philosophy of education as a branch of general philosophy closely related to epistemology. It develops a distinctively educational concept of "teaching-and-learning" and shows some practical implications of that concept, particularly in regard to moral development.

A special feature of the book by Professor McClellan is that it is believed to be the only text in its field to be both analytic (in style and content) and radical (in political perspective).

Winthrop Means, geology, together with Bruce Hobbs and Paul Williams, has written "An Outline of Structural Geology" (John Wiley & Sons, Inc.). The book is a text for a one-semester course in structural geology offered to senior and graduate-level students in departments of geology. Courses served by the 571-page volume are instructional geology and field geology. Dr. Williams is senior lecturer, Institute of Geology and Mineralogy, Leiden, Netherlands, and Professor Hobbs is chairman of the Department of Earth Science, Monash University, Melbourne, Australia.

Hans Toch, criminal justice, has written a new work, "Men in Crisis--Human Breakdowns in Prison" (Aldine Publishing Co.). Presenting the results of one of the largest prison studies ever undertaken, the book is based on well over 600 interviews dealing with the self-destructive acts of men and women in prison.

"Men in Crisis" is described as the first attempt comprehensively to map the variety of forms that despair can take, to reconstruct the ineffable shapes of human extremity as fully and PAGE 3

faithfully as possible.

Fred Cohen, School of Criminal Justice, has written a chapter in the new book, "The Mentally Retarded Citizen and the Law" (Free Press). The book is a collection of papers on the subject of mentally retarded persons and the law. The papers were written and collected under the President's Committee on Mentally Retarded. President Ford has written the dedication for the book, which will be used as a reference for persons in the legal and mental retardation professions.
