Local 301 Will Meet Tonight at Armory

Actions in Plants Urged to Obtain Union's Demands

Bargaining meetings will be held shortly with both General Electric and Westinghouse.

The GE and Westinghouse Conference Boards of UE on Monday directed all GE and Westinghouse Lals to "immediately undertake all necessary activities and actions in the plants ... now and until the date of the next conference with the companies," and through the course of the conferences, to impress upon the companies "the firm determination of the membership to make them bargain on the union's demands."

If GE and Westinghouse refuse to budge, the national negotiating committees are authorized by the conference boards to issue a call to all locals in each company for a strike vote.

Negotiating meetings are scheduled for Oct. 12 at GE and Oct. 4 at Westinghouse. The national office is trying to arrange an earlier date for the GE meeting.

The two conference boards met together in New York, bringing about 100 delegates from GE locals and 65 from Westinghouse locals. Each conference board voted separately on the program and strike vote authorization. The vote was unanimous in each conference

The statement adopted also directed the national negotiating committees "to make every effort during the next meetings with the respective companies to bring the negotiations to a speedy, peaceful, and successful conclusion."

Representing 301 at the meeting were President Frank Kriss, Treasurer Marshall White, Business Agent Leo Jandreau, and Board Members William A. Stewart, ewey Brashear, and Anthony Es-

Membership Will Continue to Run UE, Emspak Tells Convention at Cleveland

UE will continue serving "the economic and legislative interests of our members like no other union can," Secretary-Treasurer Julius Emspak told the UE convention, because UE will continue "to fight for the right to maintain rank and file control."

Emspak declared the union will continue its fight for "freedom from government domination and freedom from the companies and the company stooges in our midst."

His speech, a high point of the convention, was made the final day of the sessions. Emspak spoke in support of a statement issued by the General Executive Board condemning James B. Carey and his chief followers for making an open call for wholesale secession

Carey and his three defeated candidates for office, after being repudiated on every issue by the

convention, had gone to the press with a statement urging UE members to help them set up another union in the electrical industry. The Carey group set up a 10-man continuing committee to continue, after the close of the convention, their fight against the democratic membership decisions of the con-

The GEB statement condemned the actions of "this unwholesome group, which is controlled and dicondemned them for calling on the

Second Shift Session Later At Union Hall

One of the most important membership meetings in the history of Local 301 will be at 7:30 p.m. tonight (Thursday) at the state armory on Washington Avenue, for first and third shift members. It will be followed by a meeting after midnight for second shift members at 12:45 a.m. in the union

When the union office learned last Thursday that the armory might be available tonight for the use of 301 the Executive Board at once voted unanimously to change the membership meeting from Tuesday to tonight.

The Board had previously directed the union office to rent the largest available hall in Schenectady for the meeting scheduled for Tuesday. The armory was busy that night, however, and so was the Erie Theater. Schenectady public schools and Union College buildings were refused to the union.

The national UE convention resolution on general labor and social legislation urged all UE locals to enlist the energies of their entire membership behind the union's legislative program.

"This program for jobs and security can be achieved," the convention declared. "We know there is no easy solution, no simple formula like changing the labels on the party in power in exchange for political favors. It can only be won by restoring the fight to the hands of the working people andthe farmers of the country who will demand that promise be transformed into reality."

The UE program adopted includes:

Repeal of Taft-Hartley and restoration of the Wagner Act. Shifting the tax burden to those best able to pay it. Increasing the

federal income tax exemptions to

\$4,000 for a family of four. Federal minimum wage should be increased to a dollar an hour and cover all workers, on 35 hour week basis.

Complete overhauling of social security system to provide minimum benefits of \$125 a month with \$60 for dependents, and coverage to all persons 60 or over. Adequate disability insurance.

Improved workmen's compensation. Public health program. Support for farmers to sustain

farm income. Building of two-million low-cost housing units yearly for 10 years. Increase federal funds for education.

(Continued from Page 1) CIO "to set up still another union to raid UE, to help the employers hold down and depress the wages and working conditions of the UE membership." The convention adopted the GEB's statement.

Emspak declared that the chief question at issue is whether "company union elements, aided by the employers, aided by reactionary elements in government, aided by the reactionary press, are going to be able to create a labor movement in-this-country controlled by the government and dominated by the companies.'

Easy To Be 'Respectable'

The yardstick by which UE achievements must be measured. he said, "is not whether Charlie Wilson of General Electric likes us; it is not whether Thomas Rankin or Wood approve of us and call us 'respectable'."

The yardstick of whether the union is serving the members, he pointed out, is whether they are getting jobs and whether their wages and working conditions are improving,-"and they are".

"It is very easy," Emspak warned, "the easiest thing in the world, to achieve the kind of respectability that this gang of disrupters (Carey, etc.) is talking about. All you have to do is crawl on your belly to the boss. That is all.

Work Stoppages At Davenport GE

Tension has been mounting in the UE members' fight against speedup at the General Electric Davenport Works, Ontario, Can. Work stoppages occurred recently in all departments over the company's reprisal suspension of Chief Shop Steward Alex McGarvey for insisting on investigating a griev-

The work stoppages brought a threat of a lock-out from GE. This threat was met by a union declaration that "the workers will decide when and whether GE plants go down and it won't be on a single

Management has been following an obvious plan at Davenport of gradually refusing to deal with the union on grievances connected with rate adjustments, and in putting across every possible kind of speedup scheme.

This same practice is being followed at other Canadian GE plants. Earlier in September Norm Choate, president of Local 515 at Royce Ave. Works of GE, was given seven days' notice under circumstances similar to the McGarvey case. Prompt action by the members won reversal of this order.


