Time Off For Voting Explained

Numerous inquiries to the Civil Service Employees Association headquarters in Albany concerning time off to vote in the November 4 elections caused the Association to write the State Civil Service Department for reiteration of the State's position on the matter.

The Association received notice on time off from the office of Edward D. Meacham, Director of Personnel Services, which is printed here.

The notice, sent to all State departments and agencies, reads:

"Your attention is invited to the fact that the Election Law of that headquarters is aware of the New York State requires that every employee who is entitled to vote on Election Day (November 4, 1958) must be allowed two hours off to vote while the polls are open. Such absence shall be during any two successive hours while the polls are open. Such absence shall be during any two successive hours while the polls are open, no deduction shall be made from the usual salary or wages of such voter, and no other penalty shall be imposed upon him by his employer by reason of such absence.

"Although many State employees will observe Election Day as a legal holiday in conformance with Attendance Rule II, subdivision 1, there will also be a large group of employees whose work schedules will require them to be present for duty on Election Day. The requirement of the Election Law quoted above applies to this latter group of employees."

ID Cards For State's **New Hotel Credit System** Held At CSEA Annual Meeting On the Way to Employees

hotel credit card plan will soon be on the way to employees who trayel regularly on State business.

The Department of Audit and Control announced that all State agencies have been asked to apply for the needed number of lodging request books. The new ful hints will be transmitted to system is to go into effect October

> Individuals need not make personal application for these identification cards as the agencies themselves will distribute them to authorized traveling personnel.

As a result of the credit arrangement, State employees will no longer have to advance large sums of money which must later be reimbursed to them by the State. It is estimated that more than 60 per cent of travel expenses can be charged in the future, leaving only meals and incidental expenses.

Under the new rules, promulgated by the Department of Audit and Control, a traveling employee will get an identification card which he will present when checking in at participating hotels. In checking out the employee will fill a "Lodging Request Form" which the hotel will submit to the state for payment. The form and procedures are similar to the transportation requests in use for several years.

Further Resolutions Round Ou Association's Legislative Stand

This week The Leader publishes the remainder of the more than 80 resolutions approved by the delegates to the 48th annual meeting of the Civil Service Employses Association, held recently in Albang.

These resolutions are the basis for the Association's legislative program, designed to bring millions of dollars in benefits to publie employees on all levels in the

The Association's lead-off resolution, printed last week, calls for a 121/2 per cent, \$500 minimum raise for all state workers. Other resolutions seek to mandate local employees to better salary structures.

Here are the remaining resolutions:

GROUP D - MISCELLANEOUS

46. Full Unemployment Insurance for Political Subdivision Employees.

RESOLVED, that the Association sponsor or support legislation to assure coverage and benefits for all public employees in the countles and subdivisions under the Unemployment Insurance Law on the same basis as is now provided employees in private em-

47. Political Subdivisions Provide Workmen's Compensation on Playground Employees.

RESOLVED, that the Association sponsor or support legislation to make it mandatory for political subdivisions to provide Workmen's Compensation coverage for all playground employees.

48. Remove 8c Per Mile Auto Allowance Maximum in County Law.

RESOLVED, that the Association sponsor or support legislation to amend the County Law to remove the current 8c per mile maximum allowance for personally owned automobiles used in county business.

49. State Reimburse Expenses of Employees Transferred or Promoted to New Work Location.

RESOLVED, that the Association sponsor or support legislation to provide that when a State employee accepts a promotion or is involuntarily transferred to a changed work location a distance of 25 or more miles away, the State will pay the employee a subsistence allowance pending the move for a maximum of 30 days, and will reimburse the employee for the transportation of his family and household effects to the new location.

50. State Furnish Required Uniforms

RESOLVED, that the Association take proper steps to assure that the State bear the cost of any uniform which it requires employees to wear for the conventence of State employment, and monies be appropriated to cover such costs.

51. Personnel Officer in Each State Institution.

RESOLVED, that the Association take all necessary action to make provision for the position of a Personnel Officer and/or a Training Officer in each State Institution. Promotion to such positions be restricted within the Department.

RESOLVED, that the Association take necessary steps to assure that employees shall not work out of title above his grade unless compensated at a rate commensurate with work performed. (Approved as Amended).

RESOLVED, that the Association take necessary steps to secure increase in expense allowance for use of personal car on

The Civil Service Employees Association is engaged on an

extensive membership campaign to swell its present number of 80,000.

The chapter president and the chairman of the membership committee in each unit have been contacted and are presently canvassing all non-members. You can assist this campaign by signing up one member. To enroll a non-member all one has to do is ask the chapter president or any member of the chapter membership committee for a "payroll deduction authority card", and have the employee complete and sign the card. Return the signed card to the chapter president.

No other organization in the State comes anywhere near the CSEA in membership strength. For this reason the CSEA is recognized by State officials as the bargaining agency for State employees.

It cos's approximately two (2c) cents a day for each member to belong. The basic service that the Association provides for its 30,000 members is that of a general service. The staff works towards salary increases, improved retirement, and other major benefits.

Eliminating One Issue

I this writing Governor Harriman and his opponent, A Nelson A. Rockefeller, have wooed the civil service vote strongly, both promising to work hard to bring employee salaries more in line with those in private industry.

We present here the very formula by which they can fulfill this goal.

The Civil Service Employees Association, at its recent annual meeting attended by hundred of delegates, approved a resolution calling for a 121/2 per cent, \$500 minimum raise on gross pay for all State workers.

This figure was not pulled out of a hat. The Association's Salary Committee has spent the last year checking and re-checking the percentum figures by which the average public employee lags behind his counterpart in private industry. The State, too, has conducted a similar survey and arrived at a similar conclusion.

With both sets of figures matching so closely, the winning candidate should have no difficulty in accomplishing the goal of equal pay for equal work. The above figures are facts, not wishful thinking.

The Association resolution, if acted upon, can restore the public worker to first-class citizenry in one legislative session. We call on Mr. Harriman and Mr. Rockefeller, whichever should be elected, to fulfill his campaign promises and grant what the Association seeks. This indeed would bring equity to the civil service.

Vote For These

THREE propositions appearing on the forthcoming ballots for the November 4 voting deserve the support of all citizens

These propositions ask funds for slum clearance, urban renewal and the public housing program of the State. Among the major groups endorsing these proposals is the Civil Service Employees Association, representing more than 80,000 State, county and municipal workers. The Association also endorses the Mitchell-Lane method of encouraging the building of more middle income housing by the reduced method of financing.

All civil servants urge their families and friends to vote "Yes" on these propositions which are so vital to these propositions which are so vital to the welafer of our State and its communities.

Employee relations improve when the employer can deal directly with a responsible group, rather than have to deal with each individual, one at a time, and particularly an individual who is unlikely to have all the documentation and knowledge necessary for waging a case effectively. An organization has that know-how, has expert advisers, including able legal counsel, and makes for better results all around.

The new regulations also recommend checkoff of employee organization dues.

The Department of Commerce performs some police functions, a fact that gives the new liberal labor relations policy added significance.

On the basis of your having had maximum earnings in recent years, your monthly benefits would be \$116 if you retire at the end of 1958. By working in 1959 until your earnings reach \$4,800. the monthly benefit would be increased to \$119.

I HAVE BEEN receiving these disability benefits since January 1958. Now that my family is eligible, when will their benefits

Under the new law, the first month that any benefits can be paid to dependents of disabled workers is September, 1958.

WHEN A MAN covered by Social Security dies, does his widow who is under age 62 receive a monthly pension?

No, unless the widow has the wage earner's child (his natural, stepchild) adopted or who either under 18, or disabled, and unmarried and in her care, she must wait until age 62 to apply for widow's benefits. She can, however, apply for a lump-sum death payment.

HAS THERE BEEN an extension of the deadline for filing fully retroactive disability freeze appli-cations? P. E. J.

The 1958 amendments give workers with long-standing disabilitles until June 30, 1961 to apply to have their Social Security records frozen as of the time they actually became disabled. Under the old law, where an application was filed after June 30, 1958, the worker's disability could for social security purposes be considered to have begun no earlier than one year before the date of his application.

IF I APPLY for widow's benefits will I receive less at 62 than at

I'M 28, and have a wife and three children I've worked under Social Security for the past years and have earned over \$5,000 each year. How much could and children receive if I wife should die?

Your wife could receive a lump sum death payment of \$255 and monthly payments of \$254. Monthly payments would continue at that level until your youngest child reaches age 18; however, they would be less than \$254 after the oldest child reaches 18.

WANTS PROMOTION EXAMS CITYWIDE Edtor, The Leader:

Soon there will be a New York Cty departmental test for promotion to plumber in conjunction with an open-competitive one. I find myself ineligible to compete in either. My department is not included in the promotion program, and I am a little past the age limit for admission to the open-competitive test.

All promotions should be held on citywide basis so that all City

employees would have an equal opportunity. Employees of the smaller departments would be allowed to compete for jobs in larger departments where vacancies occur more frequently, and city employees would have the opportunity to fill vacancies before the open-competitive list is reached.

An alternate plan would be to waive the age limit for those City employees who meet other requirements for the open-competitive evaminations.

Law Cases

JUDICIAL DECISIONS

Special Term, New York County

Kelly v. Board of Examiners. Petitioners were candidates in examinations for license for principal and for license for junior principal. The supervision test for both examinations was the same and constituted one-fifth of each examination although a passing mark of 60 percent was required in the examination for principal whereas a passing mark of only 50 percent was required for junior principal. All the petitioners received 53 percent in failed the examination for prinpeals committee of the board and their grade raised to 58.75 per-They then demanded that cent. their final rating on the junior principal examination be raised and that their places on the list be advanced accordingly. It was pointed out by the court that the appeal of petitioners was taken in the examination for principal and in New Location that under the bylaws of the board no appeal is permissible in the examination for junior principal since petitioners had passed that examination. The court held that petitioners would receive an unfair advantage over the competitors in the junior principal examination if their contensions were sustained and accordingly dismissed the petition.

O'Neill v. City of N. Y. Plaintiff, a patrolman, was arrested on February 10, 1956, charged with felonious assault. He was examined by a police surgeon and found to be suffering from acute alcoholism. On that day he was suspended without pay pending departmental charges. Written charges were served on him on February 29, 1956. He was subsequently acquitted in County Court of felonious assault. However, he was found guilty in the departmental hearing and fined thirty days pay. He brought a motion for summary judgment contending that his suspension was unlawful in that no written charges were in existence at the time and his salary could not therefore be withheld. The court held that petitioner was not prejudiced by the absence of written charges, since he does not deny that at all times he knew the reason for his suspension. The circumstances demanded the suspension immediately upon the apprehension of the plaintiff. His motion was denied and summary Supreme Court, Lewis County

Berry v. State Conservation Dept. Petitioner, an exempt volunteer fireman, was discharged from his position of shop foreman without a hearing. The department claimed he was a temporary employee and not entitled to a hearing on charges. After trial the court found this con-

ordered the petitioner reinstated to his position.

Arnold v Kennedy, Petitioner was disnissed at the end of his probationary period as partolman (P.D.). It was shown that during his probationary period he had on two occasions lost or mislaid his badge and on one occasion had been guilty of lateness. The court held that the police commissioner had the right to dismiss petitioner without a hearing, and since there had been no chowing that his action was arbitrary or capricious the petition was dismissed. (NYLJ 8.22.58).



The CSEA Master Group Life Insurance Contract, under which over 43,000 of its members are insured, provides that, effective November 1st of each year, the amount of insurance of each insured member be adjusted based on the annual salary of the insured member as of November 1st.

In the certificate which has been issued to each CSEA member insured under its Group Life Plan, there is printed a table showing the amounts of insurance issued based on salaries, and another table which shows the cost of the insurance at the various attained
